Inspection judgements

Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: good

There was one child living at this home at the point of this inspection. Staff encourage the child to make choices in the decoration of the home so that it reflects his tastes and interests. The environment is homely, comfortable and a safe space for the child. Staff are creative in meeting the child's changing needs, and this helps to promote his development. For example, they use various methods of communication and have adapted these over time to meet the child's needs. This has significantly improved the way he communicates with staff and others.

Staff have developed good relationships with the child. They provide a structured plan of activities that are fun, enjoyable and help the child make progress in his development. The child is now taking part in new activities and developing new skills. Staff have helped the child to become more confident with new people. This means that he will have the opportunity to continue to build his social skills. The child has developed confidence and improved their self-esteem, which is good progress.

The manager and staff have high aspirations for the child. Staff help the child to learn some crucial independent living skills. Staff have been creative in making guides that are appropriate to the abilities of the child to help him develop skills for later in his life. This means that the child is involved in activities like laundry, shopping and cooking. A professional stated, 'I have seen a real increase in independence skills.' A family member said, 'Staff are patient. They have supported him to improve communication skills.'

There has also been a reduction of incidents now that the child is better able to communicate his needs. Improved communication has prevented the child from becoming frustrated and has helped him make his feelings and wishes clear. This has led to him becoming more settled and content. For example, he would have become increasingly anxious with new people in the home, but now he is more accepting and relaxed.

How well children and young people are helped and protected: good

Leaders and managers understand the importance of safer recruitment. For new staff joining the home, managers complete a range of pre-employment checks to ensure that they are safe to work with children. When there are concerns, the manager takes swift action to protect children.

The manager and staff have a good understanding of the needs, risks and vulnerabilities of the child. The staff team is creative in reducing and managing risks. Risk assessments are in place and amended and updated regularly. The staff understand what actions they should take to keep the child safe.



Staff have supported the child to reduce the number of incidents that put them at risk of harm. Following any incident, the manager provides his oversight, and staff have an opportunity for reflection. However, opportunities are missed because keywork sessions with the child do not always take place. This would enable the child to provide their views on incidents and potentially assist the manager and staff to understand what led to the incident.

Staff manage the child's medication safely. There are regular checks undertaken by the manager on staff competency. The manager supports staff to maintain good knowledge of medication administration procedures.

The manager has completed a detailed location risk assessment. He has worked collaboratively with partner agencies to develop a comprehensive assessment of risk in the local area. This means staff will be able to support the child and keep him safe while in the community.

The effectiveness of leaders and managers: good

A change of manager initially led to some instability for staff. However, the acting manager is committed, conscientious and is making changes that will benefit the child and staff. The manager has just submitted his application to become registered with Ofsted, and he understands the importance of timely registration. Additionally, this indicates his commitment to the home for the future.

The manager has developed a relatively new staff team that brings a variety of experience and skills. The manager understands the strengths and weaknesses of the team. New staff complete a robust induction and training programme that is specific to the needs of the child. Staff attend regular team meetings. If changes are needed to ways of working, the team communicates well. This ensures that the child receives consistent and predictable care, which has led to the child becoming increasingly settled.

Staff receive regular individual supervision. They are well supported by the manager. This could be enhanced by providing an opportunity for staff to reflect on what works well for the child. Additionally, staff will benefit from the opportunity to reflect on their care practice and working in the home.

The management team has advocated for the child to return to school. It sets up regular meetings with external partner agencies to consider the most appropriate educational setting for the child. This has led to the offer of a school place for the autumn term. This supports the child to have social and educational opportunities and represents very good practice.

The manager undertakes monthly quality of care reviews. He keeps the home's statement of purpose up to date and notifies Ofsted appropriately of any changes. The manager has good partnership working with the child's family and involved professional agencies. This ensures that all agencies work together to ensure the child's needs are met. A family member stated, 'The staff are amazing.'

Recommendation
